Apart from the Show detailed in this schedule, the Society holds monthly meetings on the first Thursday of each month from October to May inclusive, usually at the Baptist Church, 38 Melton Road, Oakham. ## **TIPS ON SHOWING VEGETABLES, FRUIT AND FLOWERS**

Always bring extra items to the Show and choose the best when staging your exhibit.  
If a class asks for more than one example, remember that the judges will be looking for condition and uniformity (shape, size and colour).  
Check that you exhibit the correct number of items required by the Class description.  
Leave stalks intact and cut them to length, if required by the Class description.  
Soft Fruit should be cut from the bush or cane leaving the hulls or strigs in place.  
“Onions, as grown but lightly washed” means they should not be stripped or peeled.  
Only exhibit items that are free of disease and/or pests such as aphids.  
Pots and containers should be clean and free of algae and moss.

## **SHOW RULES**

1. All exhibits must be grown by, or otherwise represent the sole work of, the exhibitor.
2. Entry fee is 25p per exhibit for non-members of the Society.
3. The Committee reserve the right to move staged exhibits if necessary. Exhibitors are asked to name specific cultivars whenever possible (cards for this purpose will be provided). N.B., *Cultivar* is a cultivated variety (Reference: RHS Handbook).
4. Queries and complaints concerning the staging of exhibits should be reported to the Show Manager (see front cover). Any complaints about judging must be submitted in writing to the Show Secretary by 3:00pm on the day of the Show.
5. Personal property of exhibitors shall be at the risk of the exhibitor and the Society shall not be liable for compensation for loss or damage from any cause whatsoever.
6. Prizes, Trophies and Awards - details of prize money and lists of trophies and awards are given in this schedule. Prize money will be paid out between 3:00pm and 4:00pm on the Show day. Any monies not claimed by 4:30pm will be deemed to have been donated to Society funds. When the award of a trophy or other prize is for "most points" in a group of classes and two or more exhibitors have equal points, then the trophy or prize will be awarded to the exhibitor(s) taking most firsts in those classes.
7. Removal of exhibits is the responsibility of the exhibitor. In no circumstances may exhibits be removed before 4:30pm on the Show day. Neither may vases which are the property of the Rutland Horticultural Society be removed from the Hall. Exhibits not removed by 5:00pm may be disposed of by the Show Manager.
8. Exhibitors are not allowed in the halls whilst judging is in progress. The decision of the Judges will be final. All classes will be judged according to the Royal Horticultural Society show handbook.
9. Entries for all classes will close at 10:30am on the day of the Show.
10. Staging may be carried out between 5:00pm and 7:00pm on the Friday preceding the Show, and between 8:00am and 10:30am on the morning of the Show.
11. Judging will take place between 11:00am and 13:30pm on the day of the Show.
